
# 53rd Annual Board of Directors' Meeting

At the recent Annual Board of Directors' meeting, Kay Hale, Executive Director, applauded the agency for a good year. As of October 31, 2018, there were 532 active employees among the 32 counties in which Douglas-Cherokee operates over 152 sites. There were 29,485 clients served between July 1, 2017 and June 30, 2018. Here is a breakdown of how those clients were served:

- 1,106 children ages birth-5 were served in Head Start. 16% of the total being served were disabled children.
- 570 students were served in afterschool care.
- 1,703 students were served by the Teen Opportunity Program.
- 92,713 meals were served to 724 senior adults.
- 943 FAFSA's were completed
- 16,846 hours of college prep were completed
- 302 people enrolled in college
- 14,682 work experience hours completed by individuals placed in job training.
- 1,559 housing units provided for predominantly senior adults with other units for low-income families.
- 115,598 volunteer hours were provided to the Agency
- DCEA worked with over 400 different organizations and resources in the communities.












